## **OBJECTIVE**

# Break the cycle of poverty

First Step is a visualization of the process of getting the help an individual needs to begin the journey out of poverty. In Cincinnati, the poverty rate is almost double the national average. And even though there are hundreds of social service organizations out there, its hard for each one to communicate with one another in a unified language. Distributed and hung up in each organization's building, this tool brings a common language and understanding to each organization, takes the overwhelming aspect out of finding out where a client is eligible to go, and builds stronger relationships between organizations and the clients they serve.

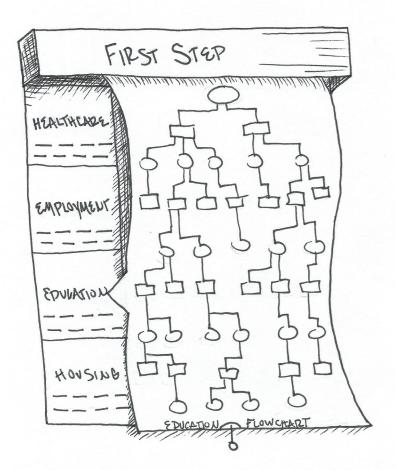

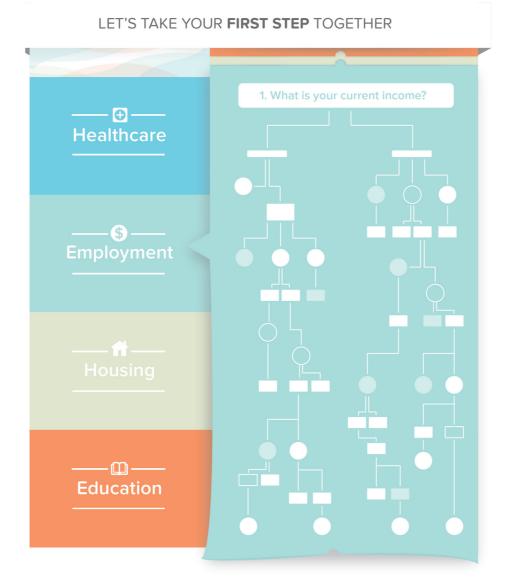

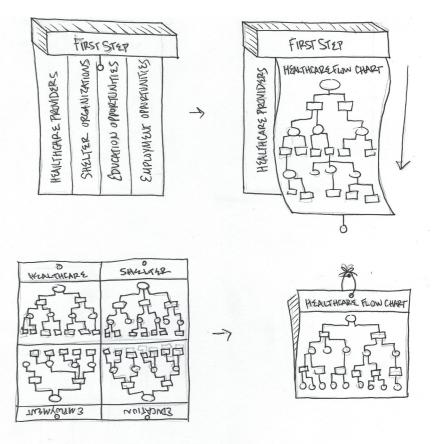

# Research Approach

We narrowed down our concept to one single paged informational poster, and began our research. We narrowed down to 100 services, 25 for each area of need, and began taking notes and keeping track of overlaps and constants to use as variables that could apply to each service on the poster.

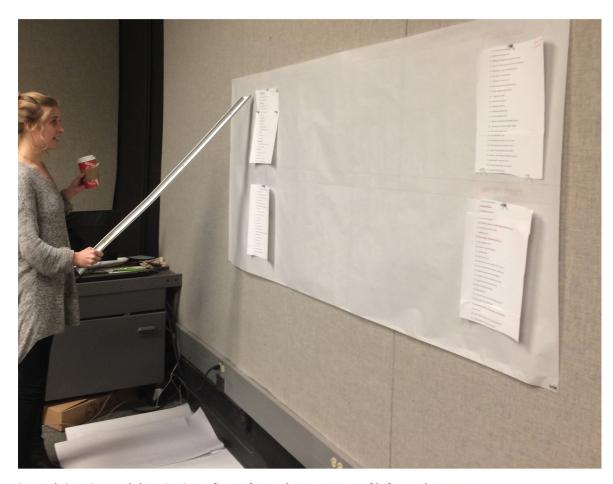

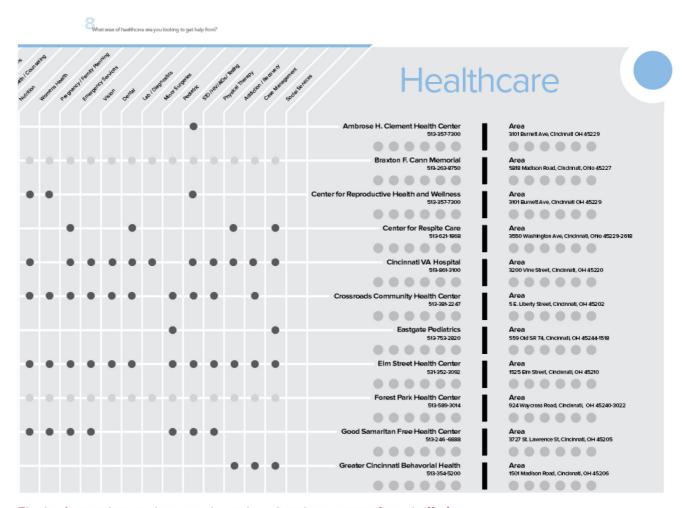
Our in-house supportive services include income and entitlement assistance, start-up welcome packet (linens, entitlement assistance, start-up weicome packet (linens, hygiene items, etc.), skills assessment and training, crisis intervention, interagency referrals, collaboration with other agencies for services, medication monitoring, pre-vocational services, recreation opportunities, volunteer hot meal program, a resident commissary, and substance abuse education.

## **Initial drafts**

Our first trials of creating the poster were with paper, tape and markers, deciding the most successful format to display the information. We asked and answered questions such as "Were the names going to go across the top or along the sides? Where would we put our key, and how big? Should there be two maps or one? Should the icons be placed under the names or next to? Which of those options saves the most space?" Next, we took our drafted format to the computer and digital created a grayscale shell of all the information we want to display on the poster, creating a starting and ending point as well as keeping in mind our goal of making sure it is informative and not overwhelming.

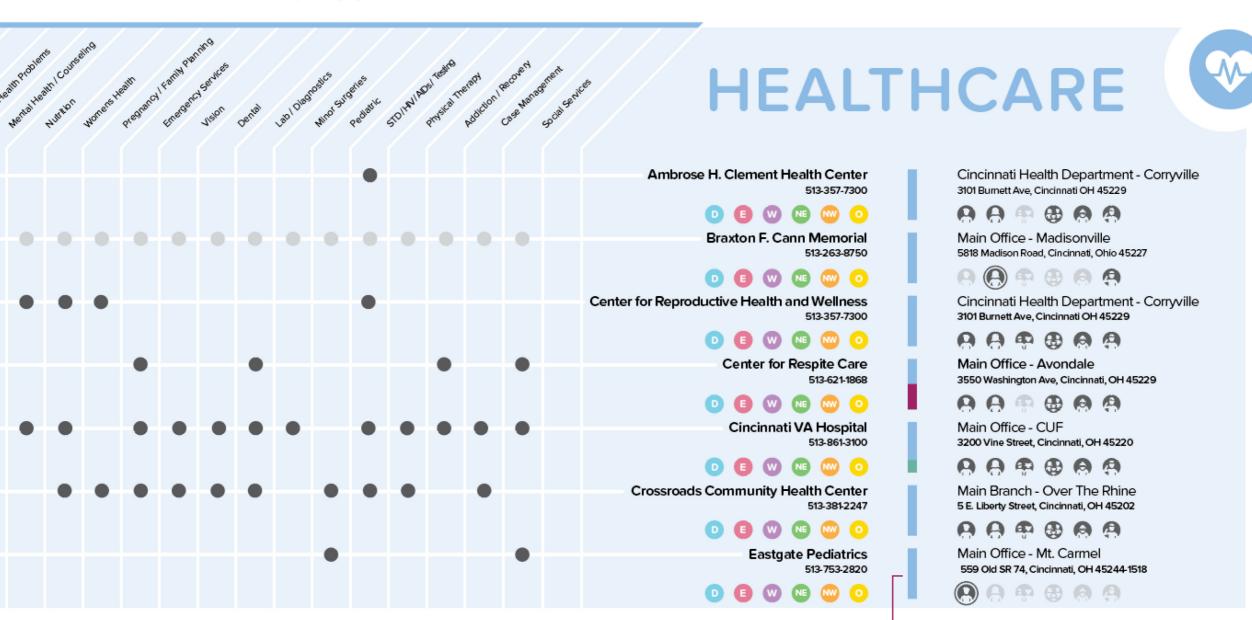

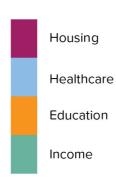
# **Final System**

The final system of First Step includes icons that indicate which demographic the service organization serves, color-coded letters that correspond with a certain area of Cincinnati so users can see their proximity to where they needed to be, as well as number indicators to show certain income restrictions and levels.

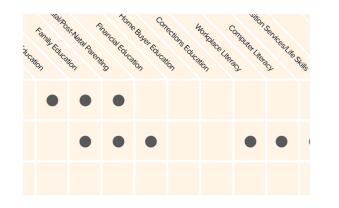
# **Final System**

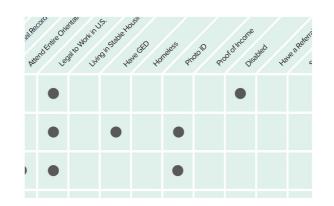


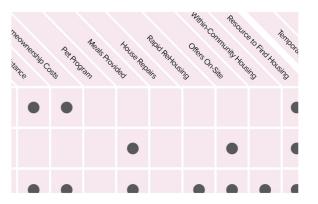
